Reports

- School Reports
 - Future reports will be sent in pdf format vs word, as some members are unable to open the word document.
- School Choice Statewide Survey
 - O General view shows that the majority of residents are in favor of some sort of school choice.
 - Would like the option for school choice state dollars to follow the student if they move
 - O Senator Testin has requested a change in entry points, to allow students to enter the school choice program at any time, rather than at the current limited entry points.
 - o The outcome of the Governor race in our state will have an impact on School Choice.

Athletics

 - O Congratulations to the girls Basketball Team on a successful season. They brought home the State Runner-up silver ball trophy.

Enrollment

- School Choice applications are up

New Business

- By Laws Revisions
 - O Question was raised regarding quorum meeting rules.
 - Current rule: Quorum is necessary to hold a meeting. Quorum is 50% + 1 of the regular members plus the Dean (or his delegate) and the President.
 - Regular members are parish appointed members. Staff and administration are not considered regular members.
 - Current meeting has 4 of 10 regular members in attendance. The more regular members are absent, the more the meeting is just another staff meeting.
 - Quorum Rule will be revised: Quorum is necessary to hold a meeting. Quorum is 50% of the regular members plus the Dean (or his delegate) and the President.
 - Article 5: #3 Membership / #5 Rules Regarding Removal
 - Possibly look at adding an addendum for time limits
 - Changing the wording to reflect that these are guidelines vs rules.
 - Regular Membership Attendance
 - It has been noted that some of our regular commission members rarely, if ever attend the meetings.
 - O Suggestions were made to send out commission membership requirements and expectations to clearly outline their duties.
 - O A roll call will be taken each month to find out who will be attending so we are in line with our Quorum Rules, and also to find out why members may not be attending. Ex: Is the time inconvenient, are there too many meetings, do they feel the information is irrelevant.....
 - Next pastoral meeting, Mr. Minter will go over commission membership and pastoral expectations.
- Update on EEOC Case
 - o All claims dismissed
- Upcoming April Commission Meeting will be canceled. April Finance Meeting only.

Over the past few weeks the MS/HS have completed the ACT Aspire, ACT, Forward Exam, and ITBS assessments.

On April 7th the MS and HS choir students attended the Large Group Choir competition and received 1st place. Congratulations to Mrs. Baker and the choir students.

On April 13th a Canon Priest from St. Mary's Oratory in Wausau, WI. gave a presentation to both the middle and high school students on the Latin Mass. He spoke about the history behind the Latin Mass and the similarities and differences between a High Latin Mass and the Mass that we experience today.

On April 19th all MS and HS students and faculty attended a Latin Mass at SSPP. This was a great experience for our students and we are very thankful for the time given throughout the day from all the various priests, sisters, seminarians, organist and altar servers.

On April 21st the MS and HS band students competed in the Large Group Band competition in Edgar. The band played 3 selections and received a first overall. Congratulations to Ms. Thomas and the band students.

On May 3rd the MS and HS students had a Choral Concert. It was an excellent concert and it was clear the students and Mrs. Baker worked very hard over the past few weeks.

- 12th Grade: Half of the 12th Grade went to OLQH and the other half went to SVDP. At OLQH the students played with the students on the playground, cleaned off the blacktop, and assisted teachers with various projects in the classroom. On May 6th we held a lock-in night in the gym for a group of elementary students. This was an auction item that was won by the LaCasse family.




Affordable Trip

ADVANCEMENT COMMISSION REPORT – May 17, 2022

Catholic United Financial Raffle - January through April 2022

Our raffle partnership with Catholic United Financial wrapped up with the final drawing on Saturday, April 9th. In total, \$9,105.00 was raised in total to be split amongst the ACS K-12 school buildings.

10th Annual Royal Auction - April 7, 8 and 9 of 2022

Virtual and In-Person Royal Auction are complete! In summary, financially speaking, the event did not garner as much support as prior years. Attendance was similar for our in-person event, however overall giving in terms of silent and live auction items from businesses was down compared to prior years. Overall sponsorship support was up. In total, over \$62,000 was raised. Of that, over \$27,000 was designated for the Fund A Need campaign for capital improvement projects!

Alumni Directory Update - 2022/2023

PCI staff continues to market and conduct outreach with our Assumption Alumni. The process continues through the end of 2023. After the directory is complete, PCI will enter into a phase called an Oral History Project, which will result in a compilation of alumni stories and reflections that can be compiled in a book and sold to AHS alum and beyond. Assumption Catholic Schools Weather Policy

Policy on staff reporting expectations when school is closed for unforeseen circumstances.

In the event of an unforeseen school closure (example weather, funeral, other emergency) staff are not expected to report to work unless their job is needed to assist in the resolution of the issue.

Hourly employees will not be paid for this time off but can elect to use PTO to receive pay. Any employee may elect to come in to work in their workspace that day. Hourly employees who elect to come in should speak with their direct supervisor and explain what they will be doing in order to be paid.

Salaried non contracted employees shall either report, if conditions allow, or work from home. They should speak to their direct supervisor. If they wish to do neither they will be charged a vacation day.

Critical staff (custodial) shall report unless conditions do not allow.

In some situations, such as extended closure due to weather or other emergency, the president may elect to approve pay for the hourly employees so as to reduce the amount of hours they might lose. If such pay is approved the employee will be expected to report to work if conditions allow and should document what work was done. These situations are rare.

Cell Phones and School Phones

Cell Phones

- For Employees ACS understands many employees carry personal cell phones and many work long hours. Overall, ACS encourages all employees to put their personal phones away while working with students and at professional meetings. An employee's duty is first to their students and in meeting all professional obligations.
- 2) Expectations for employees.
 - a. Personal cell phones should not be used during student-contact time unless authorized in advance by the building administrator.
 - b. Employees should not give their personal cell phone numbers to students or parents.
 - c. Employees should not use their personal cell phones to communicate with parents or students. School cell phones are available for use off campus events.
 - d. All employees are responsible to know the school's safety plan as it relates to cell phone use and follow up. In some situations, cell phone use may endanger students or interfere with crisis management.
 - e. Teachers planning to use a personal cell phone for instructional purposes, including taking photos of students, requires authorization from the principal.
 - f. Employees who choose to use their personal cell phones at work are personally responsible for any repercussions that may occur because of use.
 - g. Employees are responsible for their personal phones and other devices.
 - h. ACS claims no responsibility for theft, loss or damage of personal cell phones.
 - ACS claims no responsibility for problems caused by hacking including identity theft, viruses, or other problems that may result from using the ACS network.
 - j. Employees using ACS provided cell phones are to use the device only to perform their required duties for the job.
 - k. Web use on a personal cell phone must comply with Catholic moral doctrine and with the regulations set forth in the Children's Internet Protection Act (CIPA) https://www.fcc.gov/guides/childrens-internet-protection-act.
- 3) <u>For Students</u> employees are to refer to the Parent-Student Handbook and are responsible to enforce all rules for the protection of all students.
- 4) <u>School Cell Phones</u> Staff have access to school cell phones that can/should be taken along when off the primary school site.
